IMMIGRATION REGULATIONS.

Interpretation.

2. In these Regulations—

“Act” means the Immigration Act.

“digital border card” means a card issued by the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services pursuant to Regulation 8;

3.—(1) The Philip S. W. Goldson International Airport, San Pedro Ambergris Caye Airstrip and Punta Gorda are hereby prescribed to be ports of entry and exit by air.

(2) The ports or places mentioned below in this subparagraph are hereby prescribed to be ports and places of entry and exit by land, sea or river—

(a) in the Corozal District: Santa Elena, Sarteneja, Patchakan and Corozal Town.

(b) in the Orange Walk District: San Roman, San Antonio, Douglas, August Pine Ridge and Orange Walk Town.

(c) in the Belize District: San Pedro (Ambergris Caye), Caye Caulker and Belize City Port.

(d) in the Cayo, District: the Belize Western Border Station and San Ignacio.

(e) in the Stann Creek District: Dangriga Town.

(f) in the Toledo District: Punta Gorda, Jalacte and Barranco. 54/1973.

(3) Hunting Caye and English Caye are hereby prescribed to be places of entry and exit by sea for passengers brought into territorial waters of the country with the permission of the Director of Immigration for recreational purposes only. Hunting and English Cayes.

(4) The port and the airstrip in Big Creek, Independence Village, Stann Creek District, are hereby prescribed to be places of entry and exit by air and sea. 61 of 1998.

(5) The airstrip at Savanah in the Stann Creek District, as described in the Schedule I hereto, is hereby prescribed as a port of entry and exit by air for specified flights from and to the Republic of Honduras only. 57 of 2006.

4. Subject to the provisions of the Act and of these Regulations the immigration officer shall inspect the passport of every person entering or leaving Belize, and if found in order shall affix to such passport the stamp of the Immigration Department, adding thereto his initials and the date. Inspection of passports.

5. The master of every vessel carrying any passenger to a port in Belize from any place outside Belize shall furnish to the immigration officer at the time of his visiting the vessel on arrival a list of his passenger. Passenger list.

6. For the purposes of sections 21 and 30 of the Act, the examination of persons shall be conducted by an immigration officer on the vessel by which such persons arrived or are leaving, or at any other place convenient for the purpose as the immigration officer may direct.

Temporary
permits.

7.—(1) A temporary permit in lieu of a passport to leave and enter Belize for the purposes of travel to the border towns and villages of Mexico or Guatemala may be issued to persons belonging to Belize and to resident aliens on application made to the Director of Immigration at Belize or to the officer in charge of the police stations at Corozal, Orange Walk, San Ignacio, Benque Viejo del Carmen, Dangriga and Punta Gorda.

(2) Where the applicant is not known to the immigration officer, he may require proof in the form of a birth certificate or some other document of identity before issuing such a permit.

(3) Subject as herein provided a person to whom a temporary permit is granted under the provisions of this regulation shall pay in advance there for a fee of five dollars on each occasion such permit is granted. The permit so granted shall remain valid for six months from date of issue,

provided that the fee payable by any person under this sub-regulation or a part of such fee may from time to time be waived in writing by the Minister.

8.—(1) A person who intend to travel to border towns and villages of Mexico or Guatemala may apply to the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services for a digital border card in lieu of a passport to leave and enter Belize, in accordance with these Regulations.

(2) An application for a digital border card shall consist of—

- (a) the completed application form as set out in the Schedule II;

Schedule II.

- (b) the prescribed application fee (which shall be non-refundable),
- (c) a certified copy of birth certificate, nationality certificate, passport or other form of photo identification.
- (d) the fingerprints and photograph of the applicant to be taken and captured by the Department of Immigration and Nationality Services;
- (e) any other necessary documentation as may be required by the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services.

(3) The following persons are eligible to obtain a digital border card—

- (a) Belizeans;
- (b) Mexicans;
- (c) Guatemalan;
- (d) any person designated as fit and proper for this purpose by the Minister by Order published in the *Gazette*.

(4) Subject to the requirements of these Regulations, the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services may issue a digital border card in the form as set out in the *Schedule II*.

(5) The digital border card may be issued for a maximum duration of three years, except in the case of Guatemalan students attending school in Belize, for whom the duration shall be for one year.

(6) The issuance of a temporary permit pursuant to Regulation 7 shall not be affected by the issuance of a digital border card for the purpose of travel to the border towns and villages in Guatemala.

9. The temporary “pass” issued by the Mexican authorities of the state of Quintana Roo for visiting the border towns and villages of Belize may be accepted for entry and exit to those towns and villages *in lieu* of a passport

10.—(1) Written permission may be given by an immigration officer to persons resident in the border villages to enter Belize without a passport or other travel document for a visit not exceeding twenty-four hours to the nearest village or town or to the town of San Ignacio. For the purposes of these Regulations the border villages or towns are—

(a) in Mexico—
Chetumal, Subteniente Lopez, Chac,
Santa Lucia, Sac Xaan, Ramonal,
Esteves Mengel, Pucte, Palmarcito,
Xcopen, Cocoyol San Francisco Botes,
Buenavista, Santa Teresa, Chumaba,
Estero Franco.

(a) in Guatemala—
Yalloch, Sibal, Plancha de Piedra,
Melchor de Mencos, Arenal, Camalote,
Chiquibal.

(2) The permits issued to such persons shall be returned to the immigration officer on their departure.

Excursionists

11. The Director of Immigration may grant permission to the organiser of an excursion party to bring to and take out of Belize a party of excursionists without passports or travel documents,

provided that the organiser submits to the immigration officer at the place of entry a list in duplicate of all the persons on such excursion and undertakes, at the expiration of their visit, to repatriate all persons on the excursion who do not belong to Belize.

12.-(1)Every person entering Belize must be in possession of a valid passport except—

- (a) Commonwealth citizens who intend to visit the country for a period of not more than six months and who possess a return or round trip or touring tickets and such valid documents as will permit them to enter the country of their destination or from which they came;
- (b) Citizens of the United States of America who intend to visit Belize for a period of not more than six months and who possess return or round trip or touring tickets showing that their journey began in the United States of America and that they are entitled to return there;
- (c) Cruise passengers of any nationality who intend to remain in Belize only during the stay of the vessel by which they arrived and to depart by the same;
- (d) Persons under the age of sixteen years who are included in the passport of some other person accompanying them;
- (e) Commonwealth citizens and citizens of the United States of America who arrive in the country overland and to whom tourist cards are issued by the

immigration officer at the place of entry;

- (f) Any person who possesses a valid travel document issued by the Secretariat of the Caribbean Community;
- (g) Any person who possesses a valid travel document issued by any of the following countries—

Belize	St. Lucia
Dominica	St. Vincent & the Grenadines
Grenada	Trinidad & Tobago

(2) A document other than a passport may be accepted *in lieu* of a passport if it establishes to the satisfaction of the Immigration Officer, the identity and nationality of the bearer and if the Immigration Officer is otherwise satisfied that the applicant is authorised to return to the country from which he came, or that he can gain admission to some other country.

Immigration officer may issue tourist cards.

13. Upon proof being given to his satisfaction of nationality and identity the immigration officer at a place of entry may issue tourist cards to Commonwealth citizens and citizens of the United States of America arriving in the country overland.

Visas not required by certain nationals 77/1984

14.—(1) Every person entering Belize as a visitor is required to have visas issued by a diplomatic or consular officer of Belize or where Belize is not so represented by a diplomatic or

consular officer of the country that acts on behalf of Belize in the country of issue except—

- (a) Citizens of Commonwealth countries;
- (b) Nationals of countries with which Belize has concluded visa abolition agreement;
- (c) Citizens of the United States of America entering Belize for a period not exceeding six months;
- (d) Persons who are passengers on tourist vessels and who intend to remain in Belize only during the stay of the vessel by which they arrived and to depart by the same;
- (e) In transit passengers provided that such passengers do not intend to remain in Belize for more than seven days and are in possession of a ticket and of such valid documents as will permit them to enter the country of their destination;
- (f) Nationals of the European Economic Community (EEC).

(2) The Minister shall by Notice published in the *Gazette* from time to time declare the countries with which Belize has concluded visa abolition agreements.

15. The several forms set out in the Schedule II to these Regulations are prescribed for use in pursuance of the provisions of the Act.

DESCRIPTION OF SAVANNAH AIRSTRIP

All that lot piece of parcel of land compromising 1.665 acres being a portion of Grant No. 1084 of 1998 belonging to Banana Growers Association situate on the Northern Boundary of the Southern Highway, approximately two miles West of Mango Creek Village, Stann Creek District. It is of the said Grant (Entry 3621, Reg. 21). On the South by the Southern Highway, it is more particularly shown on a plan of subdivision by Department, Belmopan City, Cayo District in Register No. 7 at Entry No. 99485 and is more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at a concrete pillar, that said pillar being the North Western corner of said parcel, thence in a North Easterly direction on a Grid Bearing of 70°52'43" for Grid Distance of 112.355 meter to a concrete pillar, thence in a South Easterly direction on a Grid Bearing of 160°06'29" for a Grid distance of 58.838 meters to a concrete pillar, on the Northern Boundary of the Southern Highway thence along the said Highway in a South Westerly Direction on a Grid Bearing of 69°57'21" for a Grid Distance of 113.160 meters to a concrete pillar, thence in a North Westerly direction on a Grid Bearing of 160°52'43" for a Grid distance of 60.654 meters back to the point of commencement.

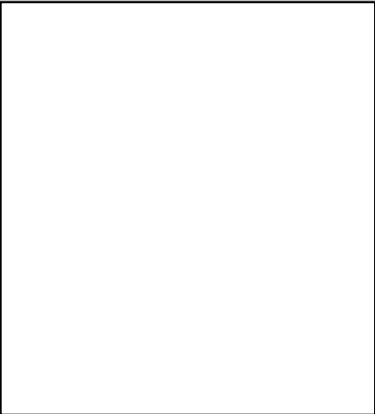

2. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

Interpretation.

“advance passenger information” or “API” means the information or data concerning a crew member, passenger, or any other person travelling in a vessel as set out in Schedule 1;

“advance passenger information system” or “APIS” means the automated electronic data interchange of API; and the screening of API by the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services, IMPACS and JRCC against a Watch List for any API hit;

“Agreement” means the 2006 Agreement establishing the CARICOM Implementing Agency for Crime and Security;

“aircraft” includes an aeroplane or a helicopter or other means of airborne navigation by means of which persons can travel across international borders;

“API hit” means a name present in the Watch List;

“CARICOM” means the Caribbean Community including the CARICOM Single Market and Economy established by the Revised Treaty of Chaguaramas, signed at Nassau, The Bahamas on 5 July 2001;

“carrier” includes any individual, company or other entity responsible for the operation of a vessel;

“Contracting Party” means a State Party to the Agreement;

“crew member” means any person that performs specific duties that are essential to the operation of a vessel, and includes the master, an apprentice, and any other person employed or engaged in any capacity on board the vessel on the business of the vessel;

“Director” means the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services;

“IMPACS” means the Implementing Agency for Crime and Security established under the Agreement;

“JRCC” means the Joint Regional Communication Centre, which is a sub-agency of IMPACS;

“master” means any person having command or charge of any vessel;

“Minister” means the Minister with responsibility for immigration;

“passenger” means any person, other than a crew member, who is travelling or seeking to travel on a vessel;

“port” means any place where an immigration officer or customs officer is required to be stationed and passengers are allowed to embark or disembark a vessel; “technical stop” means an arrival of a vessel at any place for purposes of refuelling, repairs, emergency or a similar purpose other than taking on or discharging passengers, baggage, cargo or mail;

“vessel” includes any steamship, ship, sloop, boat or other floating or submersible craft, and any description of aircraft, motor vehicle or other form of transportation;

“Watch List” means a list that is used to watch or track the current activity or movements of criminals, including terrorists and persons who have been found guilty of involvement with stolen and lost travel documents (SLTD), criminal deportees and other persons of interest to the intelligence community.

3.—(1) The master of every vessel shall provide the Director and IMPACS with the API detailed in Schedule 1 for every vessel that is expected to arrive in, or depart from Belize.

Duty to provide advance passenger information.

(2) A master commits an offence if that master—

- (a) fails to provide API in accordance with sub-regulation (1);
- (b) intentionally or recklessly provides incomplete or false API; or
- (c) transmits API in an incorrect format.

(3) A master who commits an offence under subregulation (2) is liable on summary conviction to—

- (a) a fine of ten thousand dollars;
- (b) imprisonment for one year; or
- (c) both such fine and imprisonment.

(4) A master does not commit an offence under subregulation (2)(b), if the master satisfies the Director that the error was not made knowingly or recklessly.

4. The Minister in consultation with the Minister responsible for defence or national security, may waive the requirement for a

- (a) a military or law enforcement vessel; or
- (b) on official state business.

6.—(1) The Director shall verify API during physical processing at any port by using the travel documents provided by the crew members or passengers.

(2) The Director shall correct API and update the APIS if any discrepancy is found.

(3) The master, crew member or passenger of a vessel shall—

- (a) answer any relevant API question asked by an immigration officer relating to—
 - (i) the vessel;
 - (ii) crew members;
 - (iii) passengers; or
 - (iv) the flight or voyage of the vessel; or
- (b) at the request of an immigration officer, immediately produce any document within that person's possession or control relating to any of the matters listed under paragraph (a).

(4) A master, crew member, or passenger commits an offence if, in relation to API, the master, crew member or passenger—

- (a) refuses to answer any questions from an immigration officer;
- (b) knowingly gives a false answer; or
- (c) fails to comply with any request made under subregulation (3) (b).

(5) A master, crew member or passenger who commits an offence under subregulation (4) is liable on summary conviction to—

- (a) a fine of five thousand dollars;
- (b) imprisonment for six months; or
- (c) both such fine and imprisonment.

7.—(1) The master of a vessel that makes a technical stop shall not be required to provide API under regulation 3 if the arrival is—

Technical stops

- (a) required by any statutory or other requirement relating to navigation;
- (b) compelled by any emergency, accident, unfavorable weather conditions, or other necessity; or
- (c) authorized by the Director of Immigration and Nationality Services.

(2) The master of a vessel that makes a technical stop under subregulation (1) shall—

- (a) immediately report to the Director;
- (b) only permit the crew or passengers to disembark from the vessel if consent is given by the Director; and
- (c) comply with any directions given by the Director in respect of any crew or passengers.

(3) A crew member or passenger shall not disembark from a vessel that makes a technical stop unless consent is given by the Director.

(4) A crew member or passenger on a vessel that makes a technical stop shall comply with any directions given by the Director.

(5) A master, crew member or passenger commits an offence if that person contravenes this regulation.

(6) A master, crew member or passenger who commits an offence under this regulation is liable on summary conviction to—

- (a) a fine of ten thousand dollars;
- (b) imprisonment for one year; or
- (c) both such fine and imprisonment.

8.—(1) The Director shall—

- (a) co-ordinate with IMPACS on all matters relating to the APIS;
- (b) if requested, allow a crew member or passenger from a vessel access to his personal identifiable information maintained in the APIS to ensure its correctness;

- (c) determine, after consultation with IMPACS, the admissibility or otherwise of any passenger or crew member into Belize;
- (d) in the case of a vessel that is an aircraft, withhold clearance for the departure of the aircraft whose master has not provided API required pursuant to section 3, pending submission of API; and
- (e) assess the sufficiency, and error rates in review of API transmissions for each journey.

(2) Subject to subregulation (1)(b), a crew member or passenger from a vessel is not entitled to have access to any information provided by IMPACS or JRCC through the screening of API by IMPACS and JRCC against a Watch List for any API hit.

9.—(1) IMPACS shall use the APIS to conduct screening against Watch Lists of crew members and passengers on vessels that enter into, depart from and travel within the territory of CARICOM Member States in order to provide information to assist Contracting Parties.

Use and sharing of advance passenger information.

(2) IMPACS may share the information contained within APIS with the International Criminal Police Organization (INTERPOL) and any other national, regional or international intelligence, law enforcement or security agencies or centres approved by the Council for Security and Law Enforcement (CONSLE) of CARICOM, in order to further national, regional or international security.

(3) API shall only be used for the purposes of these Regulations.

10.—(1) API shall be retained by the Director for a period of not less than three years from the date of travel of the applicable crew members or passengers.

In exceptional circumstances where it would be impracticable or inexpedient to issue visas abroad, such an application may be made in Belize, but in every such case the conditions for the grant of the Entry Permit and the fees payable shall apply in like manner as if the application had been made abroad.
